**The Primary Election:** On Tuesday 11 October you will have an opportunity to select three (3) candidates for Asheville City Council and one (1) candidate for Asheville Mayor.

You must cast your ballot at your assigned polling place between 7:00am and 7:00pm. If you do not know your polling place or need directions, please inquire with the Buncombe County Board of Elections at 250-4200, or you may check your voter registration information on-line at <http://www.sboe.state.nc.us>.

The top six (6) vote-getters among the City Council candidates, and the top two (2) vote-getters among the Mayoral candidates will advance to the General Election. Note! These are non-partisan elections, so the candidates' party affiliation will not be indicated on the ballot. Carry this voting guide with you to the polls so that you can make an informed decision!
